

Beloved,


I'm writing this in the days before the election and by the time you read this we may or may not know who won. I do know that once we find out who will win the presidency many people, some of whom we know and

love, will be disappointed, angry, or maybe even convinced that the world will end because of the results of the election.

It should have felt strange and just a little too much to end the previous paragraph by connecting the results of a presidential election to the end times, but in this election cycle it has become common to do just that. So let me be clear, this election and all elections matter. The results will have consequential effects on the lives of all of us. So you should allow yourself to be guided by the Holy Spirit to allow your christian faith to guide you in how you vote each and every election. While all of that is true, it is also true that no matter who wins this election or any future election it will have no impact on the divine timetable for Christ's return.

It is appropriate that as we enter November we will engage in some of the apocalyptic texts from Scripture. The word apocalyptic has come to be understood to be about the end of the world, perhaps accompanied by great destruction and suffering. But the word itself originally just meant to unveil or reveal something, it literally refers to the action of pulling back a curtain. In this way an apocalypse can be a genre of literature, from zombie horror to disaster movies. But the apocalyptic texts from scripture are not quite the same.

In Mark 13:1-8 we will hear Jesus warn us not to be led astray by the many who will come in his name. They will point to terrible events, war, famine, earthquakes, and say they are the one who can save you but they cannot. But in Daniel 12 we are given a vision of a time when a just ruler will arise and lead us in righteousness. The hard part is there is nothing we can do to make that happen, speed up its arrival, or slow it down. These texts are not intended to scare us into conformity to God's standards. All the scary stuff that Jesus mentions was already happening when he was teaching and has continued over and over again throughout history. The world is scary enough as it is, the apologetic texts aren't meant to add to that fear, instead they are written to comfort it.

In a world where things seem out of control. One nation rises against another and commits the horrendous acts that accompany war and we feel powerless to stop it. Natural disasters just keep happening and destroying the lives of the innocent people who just happen to live there. Leader after leader will offer themselves as the only who can save you from the world, or from their rival leaders. In the midst of this Jesus says stop, be still, and know that I am God.

Jesus tells us that while we may want to think we know, no one can know the timing of God's plans. He even says in another Gospel that not even the Son knows the Father's plans. But the Father does have a plan and that is the good news. God is with us, we don't need to elect a savor, because Jesus is already here. We don't need to do anything or anyone to prevent or bring about the end times because God is in control. In fact in its most literal interpretation the apocalypse has already happened.

When Jesus died were told that the curtain in the temple, the veil that was understood to be divided between the human realm and the divine. A grand tapestry decorated with scenes of the cosmos that separated the human and divine realms wasn't just pulled back it was torn in two. Meaning there is no longer a separation, our realm is God's realm and God is with us, God will come to us, and God will dwell with us forever. It is already decided. When God comes it will not be with wrath and destruction, but with mercy and reconciliation - whether we like it or not.

Our task isn't to vote, or worship, or believe in any particular way to influence God's actions, as if we could. Instead we can take the advice from Hebrews 10, that tells us that because Jesus has brought us through the curtain, and we know that in the end we will be with God, "let us consider how to provoke one another to love and good deeds, not neglecting to meet together, as is the habit of some, but encouraging one another, and all the more as you see the Day approaching." (Hebrews 10:24- 25, NRSV)


